### Galatians 4:21-31

Tell me, you who desire to be under the law, do you not hear the law? <sup>22</sup>For it is written that Abraham had two sons: the one by a bondwoman, the other by a freewoman. <sup>23</sup>But he who was of the bondwoman was born according to the flesh, and he of the freewoman through promise, <sup>24</sup>which things are symbolic. For these are the two covenants: the one from Mount Sinai which gives birth to bondage, which is Hagar—<sup>25</sup>for this Hagar is Mount Sinai in Arabia, and corresponds to Jerusalem which now is, and is in bondage with her children—<sup>26</sup>but the Jerusalem above is free, which is the mother of us all. <sup>27</sup>For it is written:

> "Rejoice, O barren, You who do not bear! Break forth and shout, You who are not in labor! For the desolate has many more children Than she who has a husband."

<sup>28</sup>Now we, brethren, as Isaac was, are children of promise. <sup>29</sup>But, as he who was born according to the flesh then persecuted him who was born according to the Spirit, even so it is now. <sup>30</sup>Nevertheless what does the Scripture say? "Cast out the bondwoman and her son, for the son of the bondwoman shall not be heir with the son of the freewoman." <sup>31</sup>So then, brethren, we are not children of the bondwoman but of the free.
